Kavanaugh Regrets Some Choices in High School, but Again Denies Allegations of Sexual Assault

Judge Brett M. Kavanaugh will tell a Senate panel that he "was not perfect" in high school and deny the sexual assault allegations. He also submitted pages from his 1982 calendar to rebut accusations.

A third woman has come forward to accuse him of misconduct during high school, including trying to get teenage girls "inebriated and disoriented" so they could be assaulted. A woman charged that she saw Judge Kavanaugh at high school parties where women were "gang raped," and that she was raped at one of the parties.
